Evaluate

Using the key statements, sentences, or phrases you highlighted, determine as a group what you think the big idea is.

- 3. The power of dependence (4:13-18)

In what ways does bad theology hurt people? By bad theology, we mean vague, watered down, Christ-less theology. In what ways can that be combatted?

What is the significance of the clay jars in 4:7? Is that encouraging or discouraging to you? Why?

What then is the significance or what happens to the jar of clay in verses 8-9? Do you see the difficulties and hardships you walk through with a purpose behind them? Why or why not?

There's a tendency to want to fill the cracks in our lives with things that bring seeming wholeness. What are some of the things you turn to during hard times to bring relief or distraction? What do verses 7-12 seem to point us to instead?
