Re-Read

Re-read 2 Corinthians 7:2-16. As you do, highlight what you think are the key sentences or phrases. You'll come back to those as you evaluate the main point of the passage shortly.

Evaluate

Using the key statements, sentences, or phrases you highlighted, determine as a group what you think the big idea is.

The main points from Sunday's sermon were:

Fight for your joy in God:

1. Through community (7:2-7)
2. Through repentance (7:8-13a)
3. Through obedience (7:13b-16)

Spend a few minutes connecting the text and the main points. Where in the text do you see the above statements and points?

Application or Advancing the Gospel

In your own words, describe how you think God uses community, repentance, and obedience to increase our joy in Him?

Read 1:3-4. In light of 7:5-7, how does God comfort Paul? Why is this significant? What is the implication for our own lives? Notice it's not something mystical or mysterious; God uses Titus to comfort Paul.

The community of faith is an amazing gift God gives us! Share some of your own experiences of grace through the church. How does Hebrews 10:24-25 intersect this conversation?

Read 7:8-13. Identify as many contrasts between worldly and godly grief as you can. Can you define repentance? What verses illustrate this concept?

What would it look like if we were spiritually mature enough to deal with the sin, wounding, and wrongs inflicted upon us by others? What would you need to do to make this maturity a reality?
